## Examinations (each 2hrs)

All content is examined at the end of Y13 – there is no coursework in RPE.

Each paper will contain four essay questions, with the learner choosing three out of the four to answer.

- 1. Philosophy of Religion (01)
- 2. Religion and Ethics (02)
- 3. Developments in Religious Thought Christianity (03)

#### **Course content**

Studying Religion, Philosophy and Ethics at Newstead Wood School provides students with an exciting opportunity to consider the big questions in life such as why we are here, matters of right and wrong and issues surrounding belief.

#### **Entry requirements**

Grade 7 or above in at least one of English and/or a Humanities (namely, Religious Studies, History or Geography)

#### **Future opportunities**

Religion, Philosophy and Ethics teaches students how to think critically, challenge assumptions and construct arguments. It also helps them to develop a broad understanding of the beliefs that influence societies and individuals. As such, it is highly regarded by universities and employers and equips students well for a broad range of careers including in Law, Medicine, Psychology, Business, Journalism, Media etc... Students often subsequently go on to study 'Religious Studies', 'Philosophy', 'Religion and Ethics' or 'Theology' at university. Philosophy is a particularly popular choice as part of a joint honour's degree, for example, 'Philosophy, Politics and Economics' ('PPE'), 'Philosophy and Computer Science' or 'Psychology, Philosophy and Linguistics' ('PPL').
