
# Read all over





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Happy reading! – Miss Mullins, Miss Walker, and Miss Henry

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An elaborately decorated prayer book from the 15<sup>th</sup> Century served as an inspiration for Disneyland Paris' Sleeping Beauty Castle. The 416-page manuscript, titled Les Très Riches Heures (The Very Rich Hours), was commissioned by the brother of King Charles V of France, the Duke of Berry, and serves as a 'book of hours' – recording Christian prayers to be said at each canonical hour of the day, along with a calendar of church feasts and saints' days. Les Très Riches Heures is richly illustrated with drawings, borders, and elaborate capital letters created from expensive pigments and gold on calfskin vellum pages. Images feature peasants farming, religious scenes, and elegant buildings.

Following the Duke of Berry's death, the book passed from hand to hand, fading into obscurity until it was found in 1856 in Twickenham, England at the home of the son of French King Louis-Phillippe, who had lived in exile in the UK. The book was returned to France and has been housed in a museum ever since. In the late 19th and 20th centuries, the book's pictures began to serve as popular references for the Middle Ages in the public imagination and were therefore consulted by the designers of Disneyland Paris' Sleeping Beauty Castle in the early 1920s. The Sleeping Beauty Castle is the classic castle that comes to mind when one thinks of Disney and was featured in the Disney logo from 1985-2006. # Year-Long Festival in Honour of J.M.W. Turner Announced

A year-long festival called Turner 250 has been announced to celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of artist J.M.W. (Joseph Mallord William) Turner, who was born April 23rd 1775. Turner is regarded as one of the greatest romantic artists and is known for his stunning landscapes and seascapes that often reflect the impact of the Industrial Revolution on the environment. He was known as 'the painter of light' due to the masterful use of light and colour in his paintings.

The Turner 250 festival will consist of myriad events including a comprehensive online catalogue of Turner's sketches and watercolours, and special displays at physical venues such as the Turner Contemporary Gallery in Margate. Tate Britain will showcase over 150 of Turner's works throughout the year, highlighting his significance in art history. Turner's legacy continues to influence modern artists, and his works such as *The Fighting Temeraire* (an oil on canvas of a ship being towed up the River Thames) are celebrated for their dramatic depictions of nature through landscape. Artists also find inspiration in Turner's determination to travel throughout the country, capturing the dramatic scenery he found on his journeys. J.MW. Turner passed away in 1851, at the age of 76. His landscapes, far in advance of their time, have been called forerunners of Impressionism, but they also possess traits that influenced Expressionism, and many of his late compositions are thoroughly surrealistic. Turner's art cannot be comprehended by such its essence remains a riddle to art history even today. For his work arises from a unique relation to the nature that it through his brilliant sketches, he found his way already in the 19th century to a rigorously open kind of painting in which nature sets free the use of colour. And through the workings of the natural elements - especially atmospheric light - Turner confronted nature at the point where nature itself is an image. #### I, Robot by Isaac Asimov

The three laws of Robotics: 1) A robot may not injure a human being or, through inaction, allow a human being to come to harm. 2) A robot must obey orders given to it by human beings except where such orders would conflict with the First Law. 3) A robot must protect its own existence as long as such protection does not conflict with the First or Second Law. With these three, simple directives, Isaac Asimov changed our perception of robots forever when he formulated the laws governing their behaviour. In I, Robot, Asimov chronicles the development of the robot through a series of interlinked stories: from its primitive origins in the present to its ultimate perfection in the not-so-distant future--a future in which humanity itself may be rendered obsolete.

#### Harriet the Spy by Louise Fitzhugh

Harriet the Spy has a secret notebook that she fills with utterly honest jottings about her parents, her classmates, and her neighbours. Established in 1999 in the USA, Robinson Crusoe Day celebrates Daniel Defoe's literary work and its legacy in literature. Robinson Crusoe, published in 1719, follows the titular character after he is cast away and tracks the ensuing 28 years he spends on a remote tropical island. The story, often mistaken for an autobiography, may have been inspired by the real-life experiences of Scottish sailor Alexander Selkirk, who was stranded on an island for four years - that island is known as Robinson Crusoe Island in modern-day Chile. Robinson Crusoe has captivated adventure lovers for over 300 years, and people observe the day by not only reading the book, but enjoying the films it inspired such as *The* Wild Life (2016) which is an animated adaptation of the novel told from the perspective of the parrot, Poll. Defoe's novel highlighted the harsh realities of survival at sea and inspired modern lifeboat kits.

# Robinson Crusoe by Daniel Defoe

From its first publication in 1719, Robinson Crusoe has been printed in over 700 editions. It has inspired almost every conceivable kind of imitation and variation, and been the subject of plays, opera, cartoons, and computer games. The character of Crusoe has entered the consciousness of each succeeding generation as readers add their own interpretation to the adventures so thrillingly 'recorded' by Defoe. Praised by eminent figures such as Coleridge, Rousseau and Wordsworth, this perennially popular book was cited by Karl Marx in Das Kapital to illustrate economic theory.
