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
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


A Million to One by Adiba Jaigirdar

As a scholarship student—and one of only two students of Indian heritage—her future at the elite school depends on her ability to keep a low profile and spotless record. But when one of the most popular and richest kids in the school ends up dead in the exact same way as a character in a short story she wrote, Jess unintentionally finds herself at the centre of the investigation. And then Jess receives an anonymous text thanking her for the inspiration. As rumours run rampant about who the murderer could be, Jess knows if she doesn't solve this mystery herself, she'll be dead too.



Run away from what they see. Discover who you are. Maudie and Jake's family is falling to pieces - their mum's been struggling with her grief since they lost Dad and one night she vanishes. 


The First Move by Jenny Ireland

Juliet thinks someone like Ronan could never be interested in someone like her - and she wouldn't want him to be anyway because he always acts like he's cooler than everyone else. Whereas, Ronan thinks life is already too complicated for dating and just wants to keep his head down at school. Little do they know they've already discovered each other online, and have more in common than they think...

Away With Words by Sophie Cameron

Gala and her dad, Jordi, have just moved from home in Catalonia to a town in Scotland, to live with Jordi's boyfriend Ryan. Gala doesn't speak much English, and feels lost, lonely and unable to be her usual funny self. Until she befriends Natalie, a girl with selective mutism. The two girls find their own ways to communicate, which includes collecting other people's discarded words. They use the words to write anonymous supportive poems for their classmates, but then someone begins leaving nasty messages using the same method – and the girls are blamed. Gala has finally started adapting to her new life in Scotland and is determined to find the culprit. Can she and Natalie show the school who they really are?

Coach Williams decides to take advantage of the boys' morale after a recent victory and assigns them a course of team building exercises to further deepen their bonds. It takes a shoplifting scandal, a couple of moonlit forest strolls, several hilariously bad dates, and a whole lot of introspection for the team to realize they are stronger together than they could ever be apart.

Northern California, during the violent end of the 1960s. At the start of summer, a lonely and thoughtful teenager, Evie Boyd, sees a group of girls in the park, and is immediately caught by their freedom, their careless dress, their dangerous aura of abandon. Soon, Evie is in thrall to Suzanne, a mesmerizing older girl, and is drawn into the circle of a soon-to-be infamous cult and the man who is its charismatic leader. Hidden in the hills, their sprawling ranch is eerie and run down, but to Evie, it is exotic, thrilling, charged a place where she feels desperate to be accepted. As she spends more time away from her mother and the rhythms of her daily life, and as her obsession with Suzanne intensifies, Evie does not realize she is coming closer and closer to unthinkable violence, and to that moment in a girl's life when everything can go horribly wrong.

Termush by Sven Holm

(Recommended for Older Readers)

Welcome to Termush: a luxury coastal resort like no other. All the wealthy guests are survivors: preppers who reserved rooms long before the Disaster, Inside, they embrace exclusive radiation shelters, ambient music and lavish provisions: outside, radioactive dust falls on the sculpture park, security men step over dead birds, and a reconnaissance party embarks. Despite weathering a nuclear apocalypse, their problems are only just beginning. Soon, the Management begins censoring news; disruptive guests are sedated; initial generosity towards Strangers ceases as fears of contamination and limited resources grow. But as the numbers - and desperation - of external survivors increase, they must decide what it means to forge a new moral code at the end (or beginning?) of the world...

Silver Under Nightfall by Rin Chupeco

Remy Pendergast is a masterful hunter, but rumours that he's half-vampire are tarnishing his reputation among fellow Reapers. Desperate to clear his name and investigate newly mutated bloodsuckers, Remy sets out alone... until fate intervenes. Enter Xiaodan Song, a kind-hearted heiress, and her arrogant lord fiancé, Zidan Malekh. While joining forces with the vampire couple may not help Remy's reputation, they hold the key to defeating the deadly creatures. As they navigate the dangerous terrain and face new threats, Remy develops complicated feelings for the couple. With each passing day, he begins to question everything he thought he knew about vampires.

Jacqueline Wilson 'Delighted to be Viewed as Gay Icon'

Beloved British author Jacqueline Wilson announced in 2020 that she was in a

long-term relationship with a woman. Since then, she has found a 'new and

unexpected audience' in the LGBT community – she told the BBC "I'm very

touched to be thought of as a gay icon, it's an absolute delight." Wilson, who

has written over 100 books for children and young adults, has recently

published her first adult novel, Think Again, which features LGBT themes and

relationships. The new book is the sequel to her Girls series (the first of which,

Girls in Love, was published in 1997) and follows the protagonist Ellie and her best friends Nadine and Magda as they enter their 40s. Wilson says the idea

The winning book was announced by judge and author Alice Oseman at Edinburgh International Book Festival on the 22nd of August. Man Finds Childhood Book at Car Boot Sale

I felt sick, it felt like a set-up," Since then, Simon has been on a mission to rebuild his collection of lost childhood belongings, even spending £10,000 on an unopened model car kit identical to one he had in the 1980s.
